- In Genesis 13:14–17, God promised Abram all the land he could see, in all directions.
 - In Genesis 22:1–19, God tested Abraham and Abraham was going to sacrifice his son Isaac on a mountain.
 - Also known as Mount Horeb, this is where Moses met with God and was given the Ten Commandments. (Exodus 19:1–3,12–13,17–18,20–23; 31:18–32:1; 32:15–16,19; 34:1–7)
 - In Deuteronomy 34:1–4, God showed Moses the promised land from here, but Moses was not allowed to enter.
 - The tribe of Dan had a hard time claiming the land they were allotted, so they claimed the northernmost, highest part of the Promised Land as their area—see Joshua 19:47–48.
 - From here, David saw Goliath of Gath across the valley challenging the Israelites. See 1 Samuel 17:1–19,32,48–52.
 - This name means “goat spring” and is where David could have killed Saul as he was “covering his feet.” Saul was pursuing David to kill him, but David spared his life. (1 Samuel 24:1–7)
 - Formerly called Jebus, also known as the City of David and the Mountain of the Lord and various other names, David captured this strategic high ground and made it his capital. See 2 Samuel 5:6–12.
 - King Solomon established gates in these three places, marking his kingdom. See 1 Kings 9:15.
 - 1 Kings 18:20–40 tells how Elijah confronted the prophets of Baal on this mountain, showing that Yahweh is all-powerful and Baal is a false god.
 - This city on a hill was the second most important city in Israel until it was destroyed by the Assyrians—see 2 Kings 18:13–17a; Isaiah 36:1–2.
 - On a hillside overlooking Bethlehem. (Luke 2:8–20)
 - Here Jesus gave the Sermon on the Mount, on a hillside above the Sea of Galilee. See especially Matthew 5–7.
 - A city famous for pagan worship, also called Paneas, on the side of Mount Hermon, where Jesus asked his disciples, “Who do you say I am?” (Matthew 16:13–17)
 - In Galilee, the traditional site of the Transfiguration—see Luke 9:28–36.
 - Overlooking Jerusalem, where Jesus ascended into heaven. See Luke 24:50–52.
 - The site of the Jews’ last stand after the fall of Jerusalem.
 - Where the Dead Sea Scrolls were found in a cave.
